## WHO WE ARE

Providence House is **Ohio's first and one of the largest and longest-operating licensed Family Preservation Crisis Nurseries** in North America.

**We've kept more than 20,000 kids safe and families together** since 1981, and remain dedicated to supporting children and families in a respectful, accessible, and enduring way through our caring and experienced team.



## WHAT WE DO

We **provide free, voluntary, emergency shelter to children** newborn through age 12 whose families are experiencing crisis.

While their children stay with us, we **offer supportive services to help parents and guardians** address the challenges they're facing and reduce system involvement, prevent foster care placements, and build a stronger future.



## WHY WE STAND OUT

We are the **first and only Crisis Nursery to be listed on the national California Evidence-Based Clearinghouse** as a research-based model for child welfare.

We are **accredited and evaluated as a national model** for child abuse prevention and family preservation. We are truly unique in our mission and philosophy as the **only program of our type in Greater Cleveland.**

## We Served 2,141 Children & Families



- 214 children from 187 families in our Crisis Nursery
- 312 families & 1,313 individuals in our Community Referral Program
- 141 families & 427 individuals at Community Distribution Events

3 in our Emergency Placement Program




## We Kept Families Together

## What Is Respite Care?

Respite is our most preventative service to mitigate or de-escalate crises from unintentionally impacting child safety or decreasing family stability.

In these cases, families proactively seek our support to reduce risk for their children.

### **Respite Examples**

- Caregiver mental health, sobriety maintenance, and/or medication adjustment periods
- Care for children with behavioral or developmental diagnoses to focus on other family members' wellbeing
- Medically necessary recovery periods of a caregiver, such as dialysis or chemotherapy
- Support for hardworking parents who have no other support system to care for their children



# How We Supported Our Families

While their children stayed in our Crisis Nursery, our Licensed Social Workers engaged with parents and guardians to deliver:





699 Parent Visits

including home, offsite, onsite & medical visits



309 Referrals

to our partners for additional support services



772 Case Management Contact Hours

in person & virtual



190 Parent Support Sessions

both individual & group



104 Medical Appointments

for children



144 Bus Passes & 57 Ride Shares

to access services

## We Provided Essential Items to Help Make Ends Meet

We also support our Providence House families by providing essential items they need to care for their children, such as diapers, wipes, children's clothing, and hygiene products.

# Community Referral Program

Our Community Referral Program allows families who are not using our Crisis Nursery to receive essential items through a referral from a partner community agency.

This helps us support more families across Northeast Ohio and further prevent crises.



We supported **89% of families'** requests



312 families received 1,106 items



We hosted 7 distribution events, reaching 250 families




